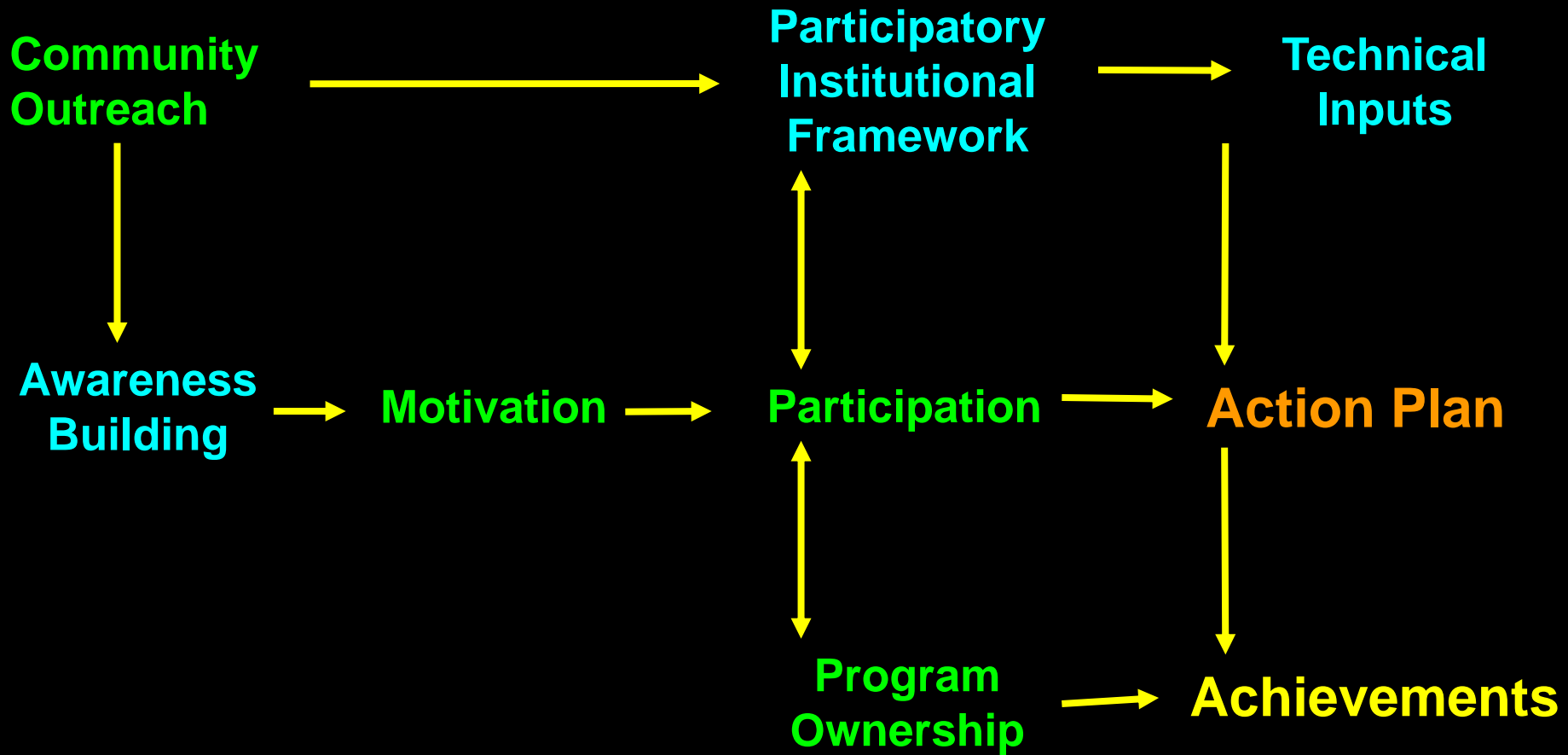

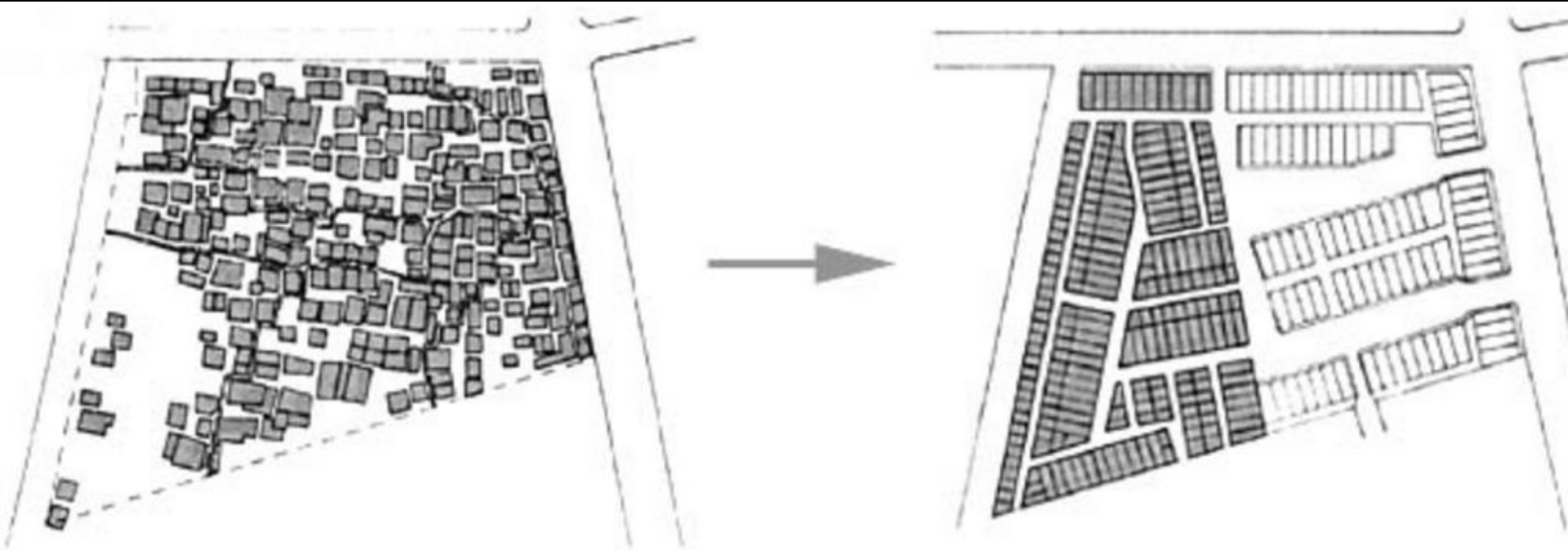

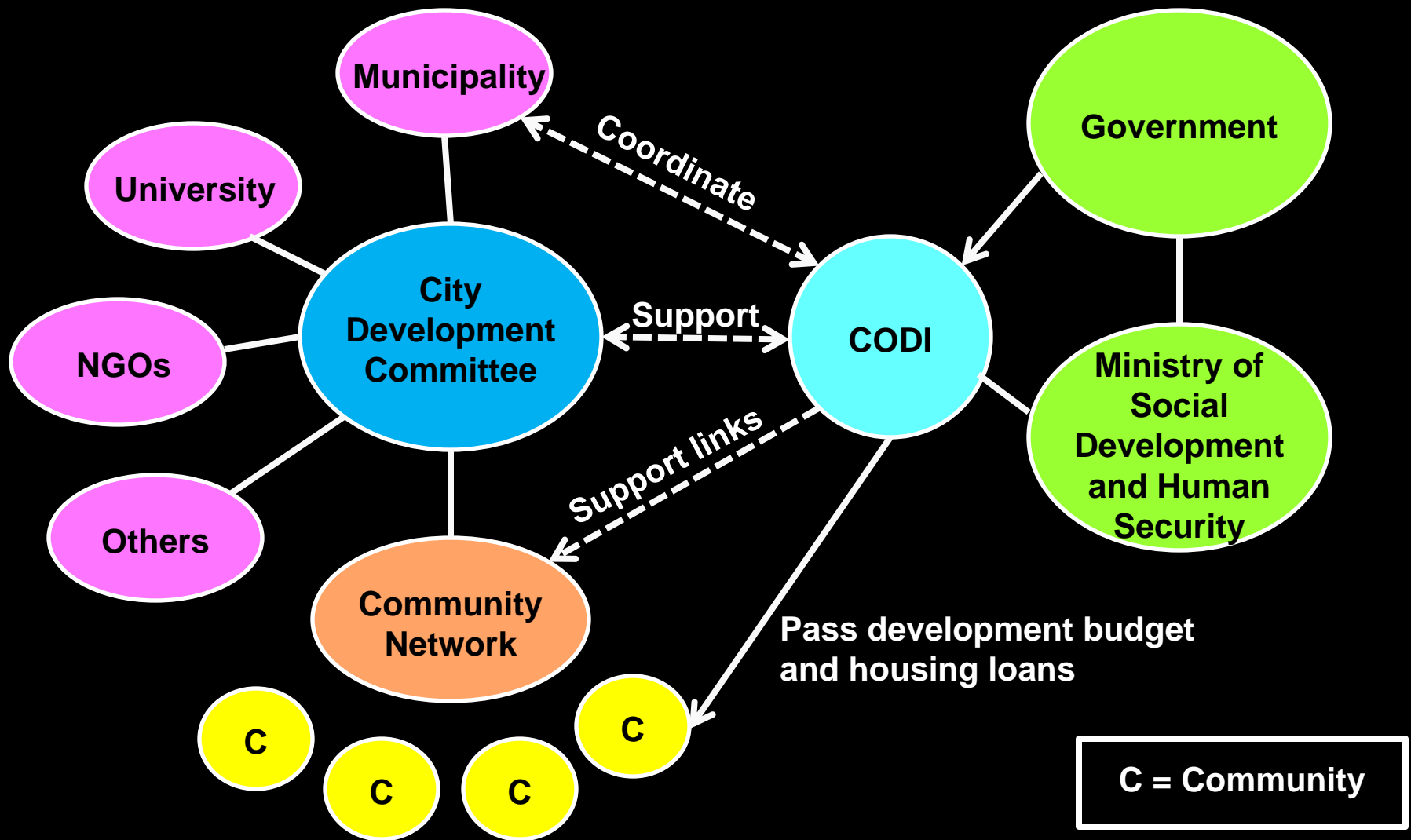

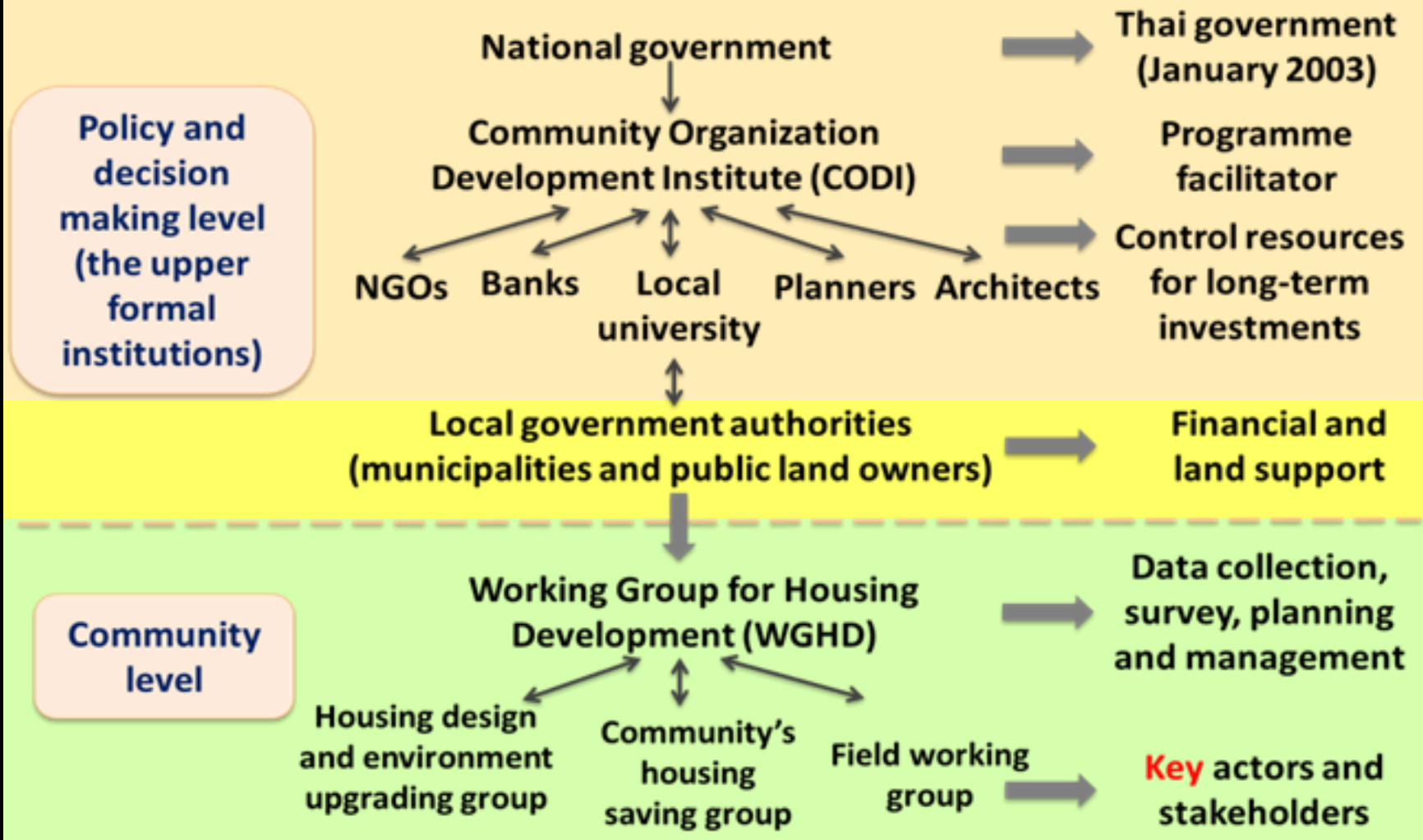

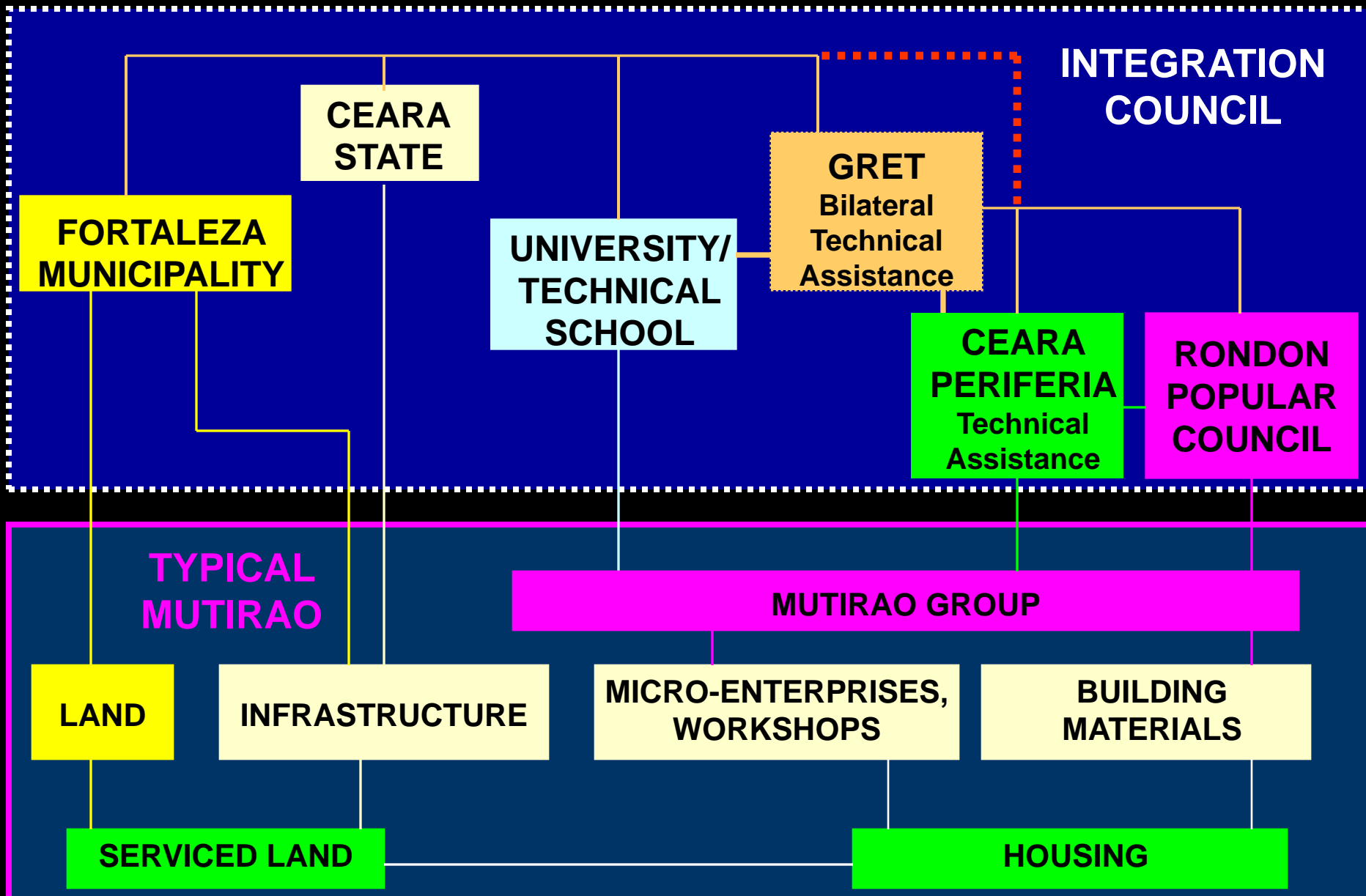


COMMUNITY LED DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM

FORTALEZA – COMUNIDADES PROJECT 1988

- 1. Guiding uncontrolled urban growth**
- 2. Providing housing options to the very poor**
- 3. Implementing multi-sectoral interventions to foster social inclusion**
- 4. Establishing community based outreach methods**
- 5. Building partnerships among stakeholders and among NGOs and CBOs**
- 6. Organizing and empowering marginalized population groups through specialized NGOs**
- 7. Delivering credit in difficult economic macro context**
- 8. Establishing a productive interface between municipalities and poor communities**
- 9. Building capacity and citizenship among poor and marginalized population groups**

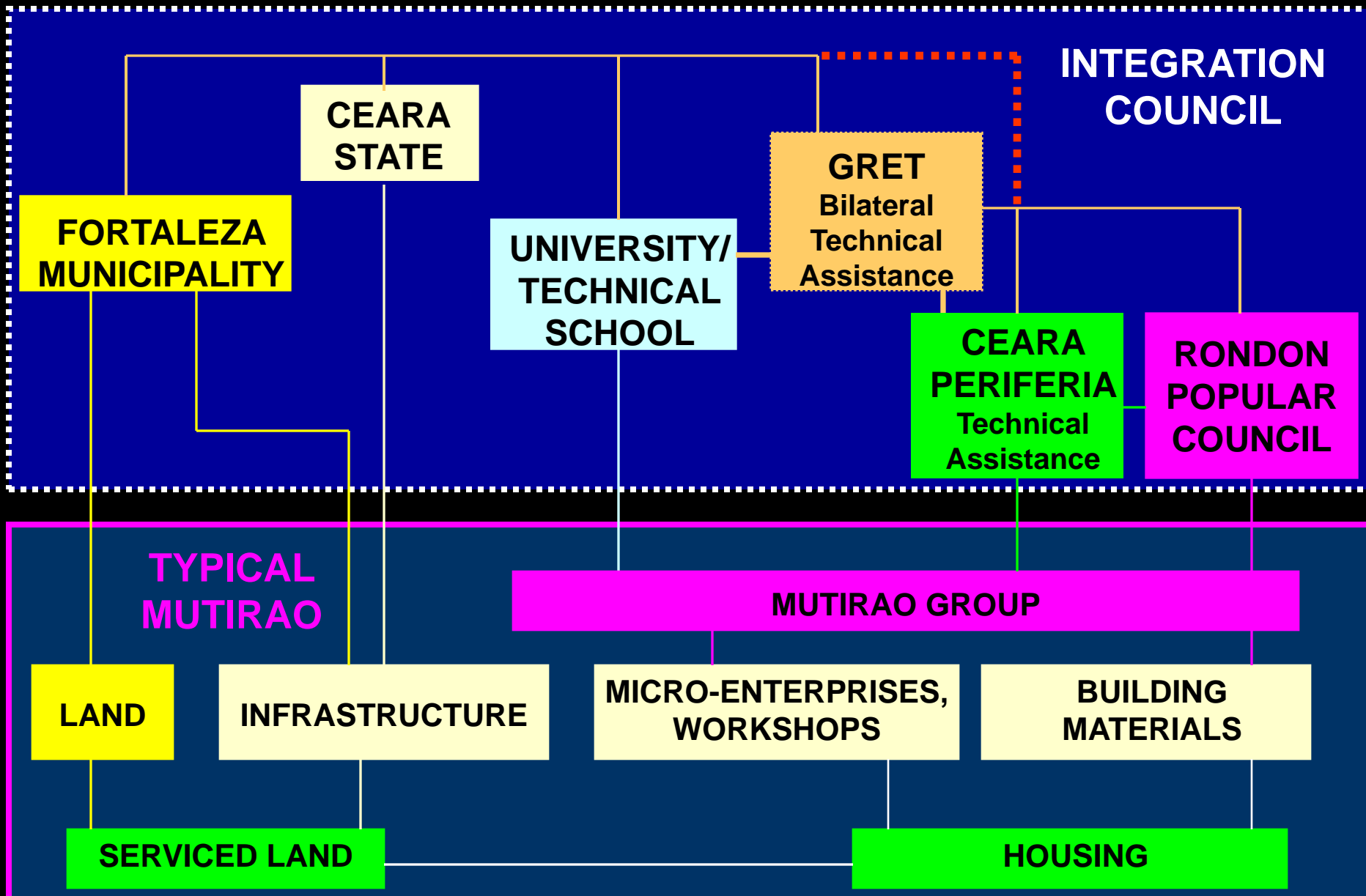

AHMEDABAD, INDIA 1990's: HOUSING SITUATION

- 40% OF THE CITY'S HOUSING IS IN 2,000 SLUMS
- 80 FAMILIES PER SLUM
- 2-3 WATER TAPS PER SLUM
- 10% PERMANENT STRUCTURES
- OPEN AIR SEWER LINES AND DRAINAGE
- LIMITED TOILET FACILITIES BEYOND USABLE CAPACITY
